WORLD WAR I 'AVENUES OF HONOUR'

The trees in this avenue were planted as a living tribute to the men from the local district who sacrificed their lives during the First World War (1914-18). Historical records indicate that 499 men enlisted from the Balmoral Shire district.

An avenue of 67 weeping figs (Ficus benjamina) was planted on 27 September 1919 by the families of fallen servicemen and 19 of the original trees remain today. The trees were affixed with a metal plate bearing the name of each fallen soldier. In 2014, 15 Ficus benjaminas were planted to reinstate the honour avenue.

History of the Mooanmbel ANZAC Avenue

In July 22, 1918, a public meeting was held to discuss the planting of the Avenue of Honour. Fifty two trees were purchased with Shire Council funds which included 26 Cypress Pine, 8 Oriental Plane, 6 English Oak, 6 English Eim and 6 Silky Oak. Local volunteers planted the trees with the pines placed alternately. Tree guards were also eracted. On August 17, 1918 the Dedication of ANZAC Avenue was made.

NAME + Greene Hardy J R Hardy W + Hope G Humphrey Larkins J Loft H H + Loft W I + Luscom

G.R.Hope's tree was to be the Tree No.1 as he was the first soldier from Moonambel, 'killed in action' at Lone Pine.

Over time, some trees were replaced with different species and all the plaques disappeared. In 2015, Moonambel Arts & History Group restored Moonambel's ANZAC Avenue by replanting 8 trees and placing 52 tree plaques.
